

The new year began with a bang for the Falls School of Business as Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) was invited to appear on "Inside Indiana Business with Gerry Dick," Indiana's most watched local business television program. Gerry Dick is the president of Grow Indiana Media Ventures, a multimedia company that spreads Indiana business news through radio, the Internet, and television.

Dr. Terry Truitt, dean of the FSB, and Andrew Rosenberg, vice president of consulting, were invited to share how SIFE Consulting is plugging the brain drain in Indiana.

SIFE Consulting aligns five developing companies with five students each to work on a variety of projects such as marketing campaigns or Web site development. The goal of the program is to retain college graduates in Indiana by creating jobs and exposing students to local opportunities.

FOX FACILITATES STUDENT LEADERSHIP FORUM

Elsewhere within the FSB, Jerry Fox was invited to facilitate a group at the annual Indiana Student Leadership Forum on Faith and Values. Hosted by Rep. Mike Pence of Indiana's 6th Congressional District, "the forum brings students and politicians together to discuss a model of student leadership," said Fox. "We began by hearing government officials share how their faith led them to their positions and how it informed their work."

Nearly 70 students from 26 universities across Indiana gathered for the weekend of service and discussion. The students and facilitators served the community at various organizations, such as food pantries and the Wheeler Mission.

Fox was struck by the idea that some of the most powerful people in the state were serving some of the least powerful. "We often live in the illusion of independence, but by serving people who are openly dependent on your love and concern, there comes a realization that we're all dependent on God's grace," he said. "There's humility in that dependence."

Politics were pushed aside for the weekend as state representatives from both ends of the political spectrum came together for the forum. "They are there saying 'servanthood is what this is all about,'" said Fox.

If January was any indication of what's to come, 2005 will be a great year for the FSB!

THOMAS WINS DICKMANN SCHOLARSHIP

Patricia Thomas was named this year's Charles and Hazel Dickmann Scholarship recipient at a joint meeting with the Falls School of Business and the Anderson Chamber of Commerce in early December.

Thomas, a junior accounting major, went into the military after high school. Now 30, she is juggling a family (husband and two children) and full-time course load.

"The scholarship means a lot to me," said Thomas. "Not only did it help me a great deal with tuition, but it makes me feel that working hard really pays off."

Originally from El Paso, Texas, Thomas hopes to remain in Anderson after graduating in 2006. "I hope to get a job so that I can save money to possibly start a small business in Anderson," she said.

Thomas worked at Delco Remy America for almost nine years before coming to AU. "The most important lesson I learned at Anderson University is that furthering my education can open up a lot of doors to great opportunities," Thomas added.

Each year the Dickmann Scholarship is awarded to a student from Madison County who is studying at the FSB.

ALUMNI STILL INVOLVED A DECADE AFTER GRADUATION

When Tobin Senefeld worked in finances in New York during the mid-1990s, he never dreamed he would return to his alma mater to teach. Yet for the last few years, Senefeld has taught both undergrad and MBA classes at the FSB while working full time as the president and director of commercial and municipal lending for Indianapolis' 1st Indiana Group. Additionally, Senefeld serves on the Dean's Advisory Council at the FSB.

"It was a real honor to be asked to teach," said Senefeld, "although, I don't like to call it teaching. We're working together to understand concepts."

After earning his undergraduate degree in accounting and business planning in 1991, Senefeld spent the 1990s working with various firms on both coasts before returning to Indiana. Senefeld returned to the FSB in 2000 to earn a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree.

Senefeld still recalls a lesson taught by one of his accounting professors at AU. "When you're willing to do the things that others aren't willing to do, like work harder and study harder, you'll be successful in business and, really, all walks of life," he said.

MARKET RESEARCH CLASS GETS REAL-WORLD EXPERIENCE

When Erin Clemons graduated from Anderson University in May and was hired by Triple L Youth Ranch, she saw that the company had an opportunity. Triple L, a private treatment center that helps youth and families overcome their struggles, was looking to improve its business, and Clemons remembered a class at the Falls School of Business that helps companies do just that.

Seven months later, students from this year's market research class have conducted research and presented their findings to the company.

Each year, the market research class at the Falls School of Business gains real-world experience by teaming up with local companies. The class is also working with Clarion Sensing Systems and Nature's Emporium Soap Co.

The students went through the entire research process to answer questions the companies have about their respective markets. According to Dr. Michael Bruce, assistant professor of marketing, the class findings give a solid base for companies to build marketing plans.

"This represents another opportunity to come alongside businesses in the Anderson area and assist them where we can," said Bruce. "The class is meeting a need in the business community, and students are getting real-world experience learning the importance of research."

ELNAGGAR IMPACTED THE COMMUNITY

The AU community mourns the loss of Dr. Osh ElNaggar, who died in his sleep on Jan. 16, 2005. The 48-year-old associate professor of accounting lived his life in service to others, impacting many people throughout the Anderson community.

In addition to teaching full time at the FSB, ElNaggar was involved with Operation Love, Promise Keepers, and Stephen Ministry. At Operation Love alone, ElNaggar served as vice chairman on the board of directors, served as an accounting consultant, and developed a financial mentorship program.

“I think in his heart, he truly cared for people,” said Joy Plummer, director of Operation Love. “He truly cared for how I was doing in this job. He cared enough to encourage me. He was that way with everybody. He encouraged you to be the best you can be.”

Plummer reflected on ElNaggar’s impact on one couple going through Operation Love’s financial mentorship program. The program helps people set a budget and get out of debt in addition to connecting them to a church.

“He walked through the journey [with this couple],” said Plummer. “They were deeply touched when he died. Their entire future is brighter because Osh was willing to invest in them.”

Perhaps Dr. Mike Wiese, professor of marketing, best summarized ElNaggar’s servanthood. “There are people who are gifted with the skills of business and they have an opportunity, even a duty, to use these gifts to serve others and society. In the case of Osh ElNaggar, he was a man who found ways to reach people in need and offer them the gifts of business as a refreshing ‘cup of cold water.’ Obviously, ‘business’ isn’t the real gift. The real gift is the heart and soul that Osh shared with others.”

VITA CONTINUES

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program continues this year, without Dr. Osh ElNaggar, who ran the program for the past nine years. More than 2,000 tax returns were processed during his watch. Throughout tax season, ElNaggar spent his evenings working with VITA because he saw the program as an opportunity to minister to others.

Cindy Peck, associate professor of accounting, who worked on VITA before ElNaggar came to AU, will take over. “What made me volunteer was the number of students who were interested in continuing the program,” said Peck.

So far this semester, 12 students will be working with the 150 people who are scheduled to bring their tax forms to VITA.

The following profiles give us a glance into the lives of our last ten Wall Street Journal Award winners.

MICHAEL NATALI

2001 Finance Major



Michael Natali has been on the fast track since graduating a mere four years ago. In 2004, Natali earned a juris doctorate from Indiana University School of Law – Indianapolis, where he graduated summa cum laude. Natali is serving a two-year appointment as a judicial clerk to the Indiana

Supreme Court.

While attending law school, Mr. Natali served as an articles editor for the Indiana Law Review, instructed students in trial and appellate civil procedure as a member of the Dean's Tutorial Society, and was a member of the Christian Legal Society.

Additionally, Natali was nominated for Indiana University's Dix Award in 2004 for his interdisciplinary paper titled, "Visiting the Killing Fields of Cambodia: Accounts of Survivors."

Natali recently returned to AU where he is working toward an MBA. He and his wife, Bethany live in Indianapolis, where they are involved with the World Alive International Congregation.

ELIZABETH DALLY

2003 Accounting Major

After graduation, Elizabeth Dally accepted an accounting position with Bowling Green State University. Shortly thereafter, Dally decided she wanted to use her business skills to teach in the classroom. She chose to remain at Bowling Green and work toward a Master of Business Education with an expected graduation date of May 2006. Additionally, she is teaching two undergraduate courses and working in the business office.

Dally hopes to teach business in a high school or at a private university. "The faculty at the FSB did a wonderful job making students feel valuable and important," said Dally. "They made it a point to take an interest in each student's personal life as well as their academic life. I want to impact my students in the positive way my professors impacted me."

Dally recommends that students use internships as a tool to help determine their career path. "I wish I would have done that so that I could have determined earlier that [teaching was] the field I wanted to pursue," she said.

STEPHANIE (ERIDON) LESNET

1998 Accounting Major

Stephanie Lesnet's experiences during the first 15 weeks after graduation included traveling among 10 states and sleeping on a friend's couch while interning at ITT Educational Services.

However, by fall 1998, Lesnet began working at PricewaterhouseCoopers where she is currently an audit manager with two large public company clients.

Lesnet appreciates learning a model of servant-leadership during her time at AU. "I appreciate all of the faculty from the Falls School of Business and the example they are for Christians in business," she said.

Lesnet recommends that current students get involved. "Take advantage of as many opportunities as you can," she said. "The transition to the workplace can be difficult from a fellowship/friendship perspective. You have chances to meet people and grow friendships at AU, but this can be difficult after you graduate."

Lesnet is very involved at Common Ground Christian Church, where she met her husband, Chad, at a Bible study. The couple married in 2001 and lives in Noblesville, Ind.

KELLI (NIPPLE) KNISLEY

2000 Accounting Major



After Kelli Knisley graduated in 2000, she immediately stepped into a full-time accounting position at Arthur Anderson. A few years in public accounting left Knisley struggling to balance work and her personal life as a newlywed. In 2004, Knisley went to Simon Property Group to work in the property tax department. In the meantime Knisley earned her Master of Professional Accounting at IUPUI and also passed the CPA exam. After a short tenure with Simon, Knisley decided to boost her career with a move to Ernst & Young where she currently works as a staff accountant.

Knisley credits AU for teaching her the value of integrity, dedication, team work, and developing relationships. Now 26, Knisley is involved with her church's youth group and women's Bible study as she continues to balance her work and personal life. The Knisleys live in Indianapolis.

"Do an internship while in college," Knisley says to current students. "This will look great on your resumé and usually leads to a full-time opportunity after college."

In 2001, Poland moved to Indianapolis to marry Eric, also an AU alumnus. After taking a couple of months away from work, Poland “stumbled upon” an opportunity with Merle Norman, a 75-year-old cosmetics company based out of Los Angeles with over 400 privately owned and operated studios nationwide. Poland currently works as a manager at Merle Norman at the Castleton Square Mall, the #1 studio in the nation.

“Marketing myself is one of the most important things that I learned at Anderson University and have carried with me,” said Poland. “Having the understanding that no matter what job or position I am going for or working in, I need to be marketing myself, and need to constantly have a clear understanding of how to do that.”

“It may sound like a cliché, but put God first in all you do,” Poland offered to current students. “Allow him to be Lord over your career path. You will be guided, directed, and connected the way you need to be. You will succeed and have no regrets.”

CARLA (WARTHAN) MILLER 1999 Marketing Major



Carla Miller worked at a marketing research firm before sensing that the Lord was calling her to use her interpersonal skills to work directly with people in a business setting. However, it wasn't until Miller was downsized from another company that she was able to fulfill that calling through her current position as an employment services representative at Easter Seals Crossroads Rehabilitation Center. At Crossroads, Miller helps disabled clients find new employment opportunities.

Miller said that perhaps the most important lesson she learned at AU was the importance of networking. “I wouldn't be in the position I am in today without networking with a fellow AU alum who told me about Crossroads,” she said. “I remember being intimidated about networking while in school, [but it's] really just getting to know people and forming relationships.”

Miller hopes to move into a managerial role at Crossroads in the future. She lives on the northeast side of Indianapolis with her husband, Darrin.

JENNIFER (STOVER) BROGEE 1996 Business Management Major



After marrying Kevin Brogee following graduation, Jennifer and her husband moved back to Jennifer's hometown of Lima, Ohio. Brogee worked in a variety of temporary positions for a few months before finding a position with her current employer, HR Services.

Nearly two years ago, Brogee opened up a coffee house and café in downtown Lima with her husband and parents. The Meeting Place on Market will celebrate its two-year anniversary in March. The restaurant is home to 16 employees, 10 of whom are full-time, including both Kevin and Brogee's father, who are managers.

Brogee went through about eight majors at AU before she realized that her niche was in business. “I think most of all I learned that you can serve God where you are,” said Brogee. “The Center for Public Service and the School of Business helped me realize that working in business will give me opportunities to minister to people that I would not have in traditional ministry.”

“While at AU, I learned that success is not measured by dollar amounts,” said Lindley. “Rather, I learned that success is doing something that is a contribution to society and fulfilling to me personally. In short, the personal mission statement I did in Dr. Waldo's Principles of Marketing class in my first year at AU is now the driving force for my career decisions.”

Lindley hopes to gain some work experience over the next few years and begin teaching adjunct at a local college. If teaching goes well, Lindley may consider earning an MBA to qualify to teach in a business department.
