The FSB has had great success — in national recognition, in placement of graduates, in program growth, in service to the local community, and in many other ways.

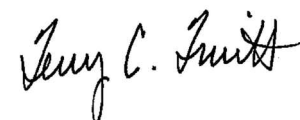
Success has also come at the individual level — helping first-generation students earn their degrees, challenging students to try harder, praying with students over their concerns, to name a few.

LOOKING BACK

This year marks the fifth anniversary of the Falls School of Business expansion into Hardacre Hall. The FSB has come a long way from its small beginnings to the *Indianapolis Business Journal's* number five school for graduate enrollment. This enhancement is largely due to the school's namesake, Dr. Glenn Falls, who served in the business department for 35 years before retiring in 1987.

Falls was the second student to graduate with a business degree from Anderson University. Upon graduation, he moved with his wife, Ruth, and two daughters to Bloomington, where he completed his MBA and DBA at Indiana University.

In 1952, he returned to Anderson University with the goal of helping improve the business program he loved. Falls wasted no time. He immediately began making business acquaintances in the area. His recommendation of students for internships was held in high regard by all, and he became a great advocate for real-life experience.

In 1991, the program began to advance at an exponential rate when a revision to the undergraduate curriculum was made. The following year the School of Business was formed and the MBA program was inaugurated. Three

THE FSB STEALS THE DAY AT THE GOVERNOR'S MANSION

It isn't every day that someone, let alone a college student, gets the opportunity to spend an afternoon at the Governor's Mansion. But for AU student Ben Hayhurst, this "dream" opportunity became a reality.

Lieutenant Gov. Becky Skillman sent an invitation to several independent institutions, small colleges, and universities to discuss what each was doing to help stop "brain drain," what each was doing to help students succeed, and what the overall focus of the future was for each institution. "The state frequently hears the thoughts and opinions of state schools," said Hayhurst. "But the smaller, private schools sometimes go unnoticed."

Four other schools attended the meeting, each represented by a member of the student body and a faculty member. Hayhurst was accompanied by AU affiliate and CEO of the Flagship Enterprise Center, Chuck Staley.

Anderson University, along with the other four schools involved in the meeting, is a part of an association called the Independent Colleges of Indiana. Because smaller schools don't receive as much attention and recognition as larger state schools, AU's involvement in this association is vital for it to showcase what it has to offer to students and the State of Indiana. The main focus for AU in this meeting was to answer the question, "What is Anderson University doing to engage students beyond the classroom?"

Staley, who initially received the invitation for the small conference, asked that Hayhurst be the student representative as the two of

them had worked on projects before. "In working with Ben before, I had confidence in his ability to represent AU in a very professional manner," said Staley. Hayhurst said it was an opportunity he was happy to receive.

The meeting took place in the living room of the Governor's Mansion, where the representatives from each institution discussed their schools' programs and futures over coffee. This was an opportunity for each institution to inform the lieutenant governor of what it had to offer.

"I gave the lieutenant governor copies of the *Falls Report*, talked about what we were doing with our SIFE program, and basically was able to show off the school," said Hayhurst.

"Lieutenant Gov. Skillman appeared very aware of AU's involvement with the Flagship Enterprise but had no clue just how much the university was doing with student-run publications and organizations like SIFE," said Staley. The other schools represented in the meeting have not developed student-run organizations like AMG and SIFE, which made AU a platform upon which they might set their standard.

"The most rewarding aspect of the trip was seeing the look on Lt. Gov. Skillman's and other students' faces after we finished presenting. It was priceless. They were floored," explained Hayhurst.

JAY HOCHSTETLER

There is a lot we may not know of our professors at the FSB, but Jay Hochstetler, our newest associate professor of management, brings new meaning to the phrase, "What you don't know can't hurt you." BSNS 3510 HITS THE ROAD

Classes, tests, internships, and term projects. It is just another day in the life of an AU student. Students in Dr. Bruce's BSNS 3510 class, however, got a slightly different classroom experience in September. They had the opportunity to take a field trip to the Tractor Supply Company distribution center located in Pendleton, Ind., just off of I-69 at exit 19. The purpose of this trip was to see the marketing channel of distribution at work. Instead of just reading about how the process occurs, students got an up close view. "I wanted to give them a tangible example of a distribution center, and Tractor Supply Co. is a great one," commented Bruce.

While at the facility, the class was able to take a tour and see exactly how large the distribution center is, housing approximately 800,000 square feet of space. This facility is one of five, including others located in Texas, Georgia, Nebraska, and Maryland. The facilities bring exported and imported goods into the United States and then ship these goods to different stores via freight liners. "Now I hope they have a good visual of the size a distribution center in the marketing channel really needs to be in order to service stores like Tractor Supply does," explained Bruce. "This particular center services more than 490 stores, and at any given time they could have approximately \$35 million in inventory."

The Tractor Supply Company is a retail company serving farms, ranches, and rural communities. Its mission statement includes the motto "work hard, have fun, and make money." The class saw firsthand examples of this attitude while visiting the company's facility. "The employees really seemed to enjoy their work," commented Bruce.

Bruce chose this company over others in the area partially because of their reputation with their employees but also because of its close proximity and importance in the community. "It is a good company, especially ethically, and it's socially responsible," he said. "They are customer focused and are corporate citizens."

Tractors and ranches are typically a man's world, but the field trip to Tractor Supply proved some students' stereotypes wrong. "I'd say most students don't realize that three of the top management positions are held by women," Bruce said. "The general manager, operations manager, and human resources manager are all women."

The general manager, Donna Waddleton, gave them a tour of the facility and also helped the students understand Tractor Supply Company's role in the distribution process along with the company's vision, mission, and goals.

The visit to Tractor Supply gave students a real world example of a distribution center in Anderson's community. The students saw the different aspects that play a role in the distribution process instead of just reading them in another textbook. Now when students think about the marketing channels and the importance of distribution, they think of Tractor Supply Company.

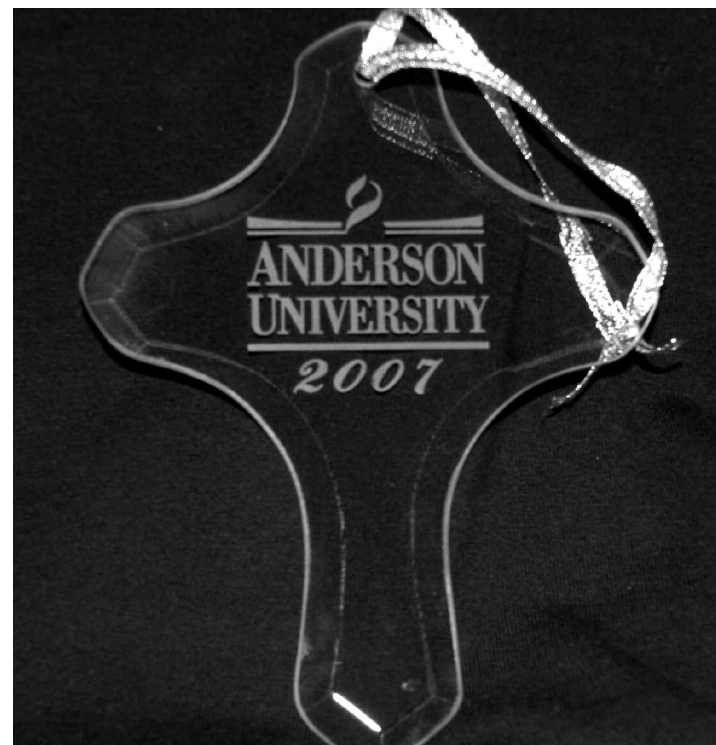

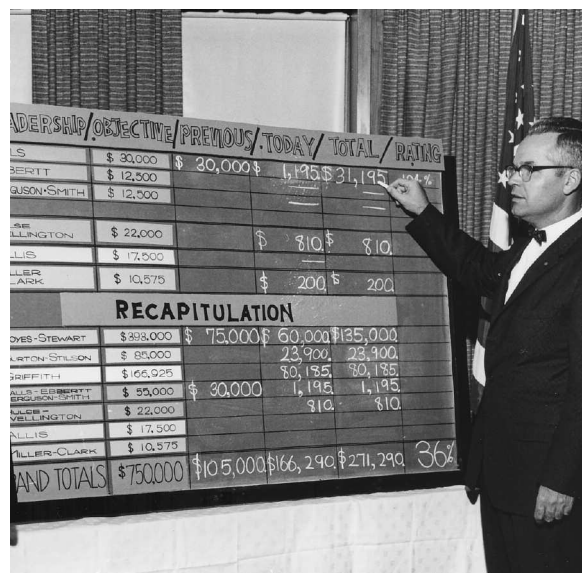

new locations for the MBA program were made in the following years. In 1995, the Lawrence Township location was launched. In 1997, the master's program grew to 150 students when the Indianapolis location began. And in 2000, the MBA enrollment increased again to 170 when the Walker Information and Delta Faucet cohort started.

In 2001, the school celebrated a milestone when it moved into Hardacre Hall, took the name R. Glenn Falls School of Business, and set in motion

the new Doctor of Business Administration program. At that time, the school offered majors in accounting, economics, finance, management, and marketing. It also offered joint majors in music business, computer science, and business administration and minors in accounting, economics, finance, management, and, marketing.

The 36,000-square-foot property provided convenient parking and an environment of intimacy between classrooms, labs, offices, and the lounge that was sure to invite relationships and conversation between students and the 20 faculty members. Of these faculty members, an impressive 15 hold doctorates. By this time, the school of business had become the second largest department on campus.

Two years ago another major advancement was made as Anderson University became partners with the City of Anderson and formed the Flagship Enterprise Center. Truly, the Falls School of Business has made speedy progress from its beginnings to its current state.
