## Campus Safety and Crime Statistics and Annual Fire Report October 1, 2011

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### Campus Safety

Anderson University is a community of about 2,700 students and more than 450 faculty and staff. The campus covers 155 acres near downtown Anderson, Ind., and is within a short drive of shopping, restaurants, movie theaters, and two major hospitals. The city of Anderson has a population of about 50,000. While the city has a relatively low crime rate, students should avoid some areas of the city at certain times. It is best to ask questions before going into unfamiliar neighborhoods.

### Police/Security Services

The department of Police/Security Services is responsible for operating the campus police department and parking program, issuing student identifications, securing campus buildings at night, providing weekly safety bulletins, and assisting with fire and tornado drills during the academic year. Other services include opening locked vehicles, jump-starting vehicles, conducting campus safety programs, and providing escorts for safety reasons. Officers regularly request Physical Plant to repair burned-out lights, damaged property, broken door locks, and other items that may cause injury or risk to students.

AU Police/Security Services employs five full-time sworn police officers and as many as 14 part-time student security officers. Campus police officers are authorized by the state of Indiana to investigate crimes and complaints; to make arrests; and to enforce federal, state, and local laws, including traffic laws.

Campus police and student officers patrol the campus on foot and in patrol vehicles 24 hours a day, seven days a week. During late evening hours, up to three officers are on duty to check buildings. The department's jurisdiction is bounded by the White River (west), Scatterfield Road (east), East 8th Street (south), and Lindberg Road (north). Campus police/security jurisdiction and law enforcement powers also extend to the Flagship campus, located in the area of 2705 Enterprise Drive, Anderson, Ind. The campus police officers have an excellent working relationship with the Anderson Police Department, the Madison County Sheriff's Department, the Indiana State Police, and federal agencies and share information of mutual concern. Verbal agreements are in place in the event additional law enforcement assistance is needed and requested from these agencies.

Campus police officers are emergency medical technicians (EMTs) or have advanced first-aid training and are available during duty hours to provide assistance with medical emergencies.

### Crime Statistics

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act requires campuses to report designated crimes that occur in residence halls, campus grounds and buildings, public property adjacent to campus, and non-campus buildings or property owned or controlled by the university that is used by students for educational purposes. Police/Security Services includes reports received from the Anderson Police Department, Madison County Sheriff's Department, and the Indiana State Police in our crime statistics as required by the Campus Security Act. The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) System is the source of the definitions that we use for Clery Act reporting.

### Campus Security Authority

In addition to the campus police/security officers, the following individuals have significant responsibility for student activities and are required to forward reports of crimes to the director of police/security services for inclusion in this report and for purposes of placing the campus community on alert for the threat of repetition of these crimes:

Individuals who are unlikely to be a "campus security authority" and have significant responsibility for student campus activities may include a single teaching faculty member, a physician in a campus health center, a counselor in a counseling center, or clerical staff, except when serving as an advisor to a student group.

The reportable crimes are criminal homicide, murder, nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, forcible sex offenses, nonforcible sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Also reportable are students referred for disciplinary sanctions for liquor law violations, drug violations, and illegal weapons possession. In addition, all hate crimes must also be reported that result from race, gender, religion, sex orientation, ethnicity, disability, theft or larceny, simple assault, intimidation, or mischief.

## Student Responsibilities

As members of a community within the city of Anderson, AU students and employees can become victims of crime if they neglect the appropriate safety measures.

Students must be conscious of personal conduct which could have a direct effect on their safety and wellness. They are advised to lock their doors, travel in groups, inventory and mark valuables, and make sound decisions when choosing friends and activities.

Students are to report crimes and questionable activity to their resident assistant, resident director, or campus police/security. Every student is required to read and be familiar with the university's judicial code in the *Student Life Handbook* as it relates to conduct.

## Reporting Crimes

It is extremely important for students, faculty, and staff to report all crimes to AU Police/Security Services as quickly and accurately as possible.

Campus crime can be reported anonymously to the **24-hour Crime Line by dialing extension 4819**. Information received on the confidential Crime Line or provided through a confidential source will be investigated without disclosure of the confidential source. If the report is validated, the incident will be included in the annual crime statistics. Pastoral and professional counselors are encouraged to advise individuals they are counseling about procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

Students who are victims of off-campus crimes should report the incidents to the Anderson Police Department or the police agency where the offense occurred. Students may contact the Anderson University Police Department for information and assistance with questions and safety problems.

The Anderson Sheriff's Department and the Madison County Police Department are asked to provide reports of crimes involving students to the campus police department.

Upon receiving information involving a campus crime, campus police will follow investigative procedures for the type of crime reported. If an incident involves a student, the information will be provided to the appropriate campus authorities for disciplinary, counseling, or appropriate action.

## Crime Watch

Crimes and questionable activities on and near campus are reported weekly in the student newspaper, along with safety techniques that might prevent similar incidents. Complaints filed with Police/Security Services are provided to the student newspaper. Criminal activity in the city that could affect students is also reported.

## Timely Warnings

When incidents occur on or near campus that could pose a threat, the campus police department will contact Student Life and jointly develop an all-campus notice that will include all available information about the potential threat, nature of the crime, description of the suspect, and suggested safety measures for students, faculty, and staff. The information will be available to students by e-mail, posted notices, the campus newspaper, the campus text message system called Raven Alert System (known as RAS), and by word of mouth. Timely warnings are issued as soon as pertinent information becomes available.

In the event an evacuation is necessary, campus authorities, including the dean of Student Life, vice president over Police and Security Services, director of Physical Plant, director of Police and Security Services, the executive director over University Relations and Communications, and the vice president over enrollment, will be notified. The campus authorities, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, will determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The notification systems available include the campus radio station, the Raven Alert System which sends messages to cellular telephones, text messages, and e-mail. In addition voice messages may be sent to telephones, and notification of individuals in buildings may be conducted by building managers and other designated individuals including the campus police and security officers. A decision will also be made to notify the larger community, including parents of students, about the emergency procedures. Some or all of these methods of communications may be activated in the event of an immediate threat to the campus community.

## Campus Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

If there is an immediate confirmed dangerous situation or threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on campus, the university will determine the appropriate segment or segments of the campus community to contact and without delay notify individuals at risk. The campus emergency may involve a gas leak, flooding, tornado, fire/explosion, suspicious package, hazardous materials spill, an active shooter, or a hostage/barricade situation.

In the event an evacuation is necessary, campus authorities, including the dean of Student Life, vice president over Police and Security services, director of Physical Plant, director of Police and Security, the executive director over University Relations and Communications, and the vice president over Enrollment, will be notified. The campus authorities, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, will determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

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## Emergency Telephones

Emergency telephones are outside residence hall entrances and at other designated locations on campus (see map). The emergency number is ext. 3333. An officer will be dispatched immediately.

Blue light emergency telephones allow students to make on-campus telephone calls by pressing the black button and dialing the four-digit campus number. The red button will automatically dial the police or security officer on duty.

## Missing Students Who Reside in On-Campus Housing

If a member of the university community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should immediately notify AU Police Department (765-641-3333). AUPD will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation.

After investigating the missing person report, should AUPD determine that the student is missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours, AUPD will notify the Anderson Police Department and the student's emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, AUPD will notify the student's parents or legal guardian immediately after AUPD has determined that the student has been missing for more than 24 hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify confidentially an individual to be contacted by Anderson University in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, Anderson University will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. Students who wish to identify a confidential contact can do so through notifying student housing.

## Lighting

Police/Security Services, Physical Plant, and the Student Government Association work together to ensure adequate campus lighting. Campus officers report burned-out lights during their daily rounds and complete a comprehensive light survey several times each semester.

## Safety Escorts

Escorts are provided for students concerned for their safety and for students with medical needs. Escort services are not intended to be used as a taxi service or to provide transportation during inclement weather. To request an escort, contact Police/Security Services at ext. 3333. The officer on duty will respond as quickly as possible.

## Shuttle Bus

Police/Security Services will operate a shuttle bus service beginning Sunday, Oct. 16, 2011, and ending Thursday, March 8, 2012. Shuttle bus service will be provided Sunday through Thursday each week from 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. when classes are in session. The bus will stop at most residence halls and parking lots every 30 minutes. ## Fire and Tornado Drills

Fire and tornado drills are held in campus buildings. To help students, faculty, and staff become familiar with evacuation procedures, announced drills with instructions are e-mailed or posted on doors prior to the drills.

Building fire alarms are activated for fire drills. To alert people of a tornado or tornado drill, building managers and their assistants use safety whistles. Three short blasts on the safety whistle, repeated several times, alerts people to go to tornado shelters.

## Severe Weather

Anderson University Police and the Madison County Emergency Management Agency work closely together when threatening weather conditions develop. When a Severe Weather Alert is announced, faculty, staff, and Student Life are notified by email about the pending weather threat and asked to listen to our campus radio station, WQME 98.7 FM, and watch e-mail for weather updates. Building managers and residential directors are asked to monitor their emergency weather radios and turn on their portable police radios for updates on changing weather conditions.

If a tornado warning is issued, the civil defense siren, located in the middle of campus, will sound for three minutes. Students, faculty, and staff are instructed to go indoors to basements, lower level, and/or interior hallways, and stay away from glass. These instructions also apply during high winds, lightning, and hail.

## Safety Programs/Meetings

Campus police officers are available to speak to small groups of students about campus safety and crime. The Anderson Police Department victim advocate is available to speak to groups about rape, domestic violence, and related topics upon request. Speakers can also be obtained to address other security topics when requested.

At the beginning of each school year, the director of the campus police department provides an overview to the freshman class on campus safety programs. General crime-prevention information is made available and provided to faculty, staff, and students during training programs and campus alerts. For females on campus, a Self-defense Awareness and Familiarization Exchange (SAFE) class is offered two or more times during each semester. The SAFE program is a shortened version of the 12-hour RAD program (Rape Aggression Defense). The SAFE program educates women in awareness, risk reduction, avoidance, and physical defense strategies. **Whistle Defense Program:** Students living in residence halls will be issued safety whistles and receive instructions on when and how they should be used to reduce crime on campus.

## Personal Property Identification

Police/Security Services provides inventory forms and electric engravers to help students label their property. Students may call Police/Security Services at ext. 4154 to schedule equipment use.

## Parking Enforcement

Parking regulations are enforced by Police/Security Services 24-hours a day all year long. During the summer months and campus holidays, students are allowed parking in faculty spaces, but all other restricted spaces are enforced. It is the responsibility of students to register their vehicles and to be familiar with the university's motor vehicle regulations. To appeal tickets, individuals may contact Police/Security Services and fill out an appeal form. Additional parking information is available upon request.

## Student Vehicles

All vehicles owned or operated by students must be registered with Police/Security Services. Improperly parked vehicles will be ticketed at all times. Student vehicles parked on streets around campus are required to be registered. Students who have questions about parking may contact Police/Security Services for a copy of the parking policy.

## Speed Limit

The speed limit in parking lots on campus property is 15 miles per hour, and streets around campus are 25 miles per hour. Drivers exceeding the speed limit on campus property will be given a ticket. Students speeding on city streets will be subject to either a university ticket or a state traffic citation, which may require the offender to appear in City Traffic Court.

## Vehicle Assistance

Police/Security Services makes every effort to help students, faculty, and staff stranded on or near campus, including unlocking doors, inflating tires, and jump-starting vehicles. Officers do not change flat tires.

## Weapons

Handguns, rifles, machetes or other large or inappropriate knives and other weapons are not permitted on campus. Students, faculty, and staff who hold state gun permits are **not** permitted to carry or keep their weapons on university property or in vehicles parked on campus. Sworn police officers are the exception.

## Bikes/Skateboards/Rollerblades

Every year bicycles are stolen and found on campus. To help identify lost and stolen bicycles, students are required to register their bicycles. At the end of spring semester, bicycles must be removed from campus bike racks and residence halls. Unclaimed bicycles will be removed. Bicycles locked to trees, door railings, or areas other than bike racks will be removed without notice to the owner.

The use of skateboards or rollerblades is prohibited in the Valley. Longboards over 37" are permitted for transportation purposes only. No stunts may be performed on the boards. Students riding bicycles or using longboards in the Valley are to exercise caution.

## Residence Hall Access/Building Hours

Residence halls are locked at all times. Students living in residence halls have either proximity card or key access to their building. The side doors on the large halls have key or card access during the day, but locks are changed at night to permit emergency exit only. Campus security officers check the outside doors and lobbies of each residence hall during the late evening hours.

## Solicitors

Selling or soliciting is not permitted on campus. Selling or soliciting in residence halls, including “demonstration parties,” is prohibited without permission of the resident director and should be reported to Police/Security Services. Questions regarding selling on campus should be directed to the director of Police/Security Services, ext. 4156.

## Safe Havens

A safe haven is a secure location at the entrance of a locked building that permits a student to enter and lock the door behind them. Inside the safe haven is a telephone and emergency numbers the student can call for assistance. Some safe haven doors must be locked by turning a thumb lock, but others are locked by pressing a red button. Safe havens are located at the building entrances and identified by a red plaque with the words “Safe Haven” located on the door.

## Annual Fire Safety Reporting on Student Housing

### Fire Drills

Each university residence hall conducts two fire drills for each residence hall, one each semester. Most apartment complexes also have two fire drills for each building, one each semester. Students are provided instructions to immediately exit buildings when the alarm goes off or if there is any indication of a fire. Students are directed to walk to the safest and nearest exit and go to their predetermined outside location for attendance prior to returning to their building. Residence hall staff and campus safety conduct the drills and monitor the mandatory evacuation of all students.

Other campus buildings also participate in an annual fire drill. Prior to fire drills, faculty and staff are notified of pending drills and are provided guidelines to follow when alarms are activated. Fire drills are normally conducted at the beginning of the fall semester.

## Smoking, Open Flames, and Portable Appliances

Smoking is not allowed on campus or inside any residence hall or building. Student Life publishes guidelines for the use of power cords and cooking. Residences are notified not to use or have in their possession halogen lights, candles, incense, oil lamps, and other flame-producing lights. In addition, cooking with an open flame, grills of any kind, electric skillets, or any appliance that does not shut off automatically are not permitted.

Students are also required to be familiar with fire regulations and to know the locations of fire extinguishers located throughout the residence halls. Fire procedures are discussed during floor meetings and are provided in the Student Handbook under Residential Life (pages 44-45), which outline how to report fires, provides telephone numbers to call and procedures to follow when a fire alarm sounds. ## Reporting Fires

If you discover a fire, you should immediately evacuate the building, sound the alarm if you pass an alarm box, and after exiting the building dial, 3333 on a campus telephone or (765) 641-3333 on a cellular telephone to report the fire. Fires can be reported to the city fire department by dialing 9-911 on campus telephones or 911 on cellular telephones.

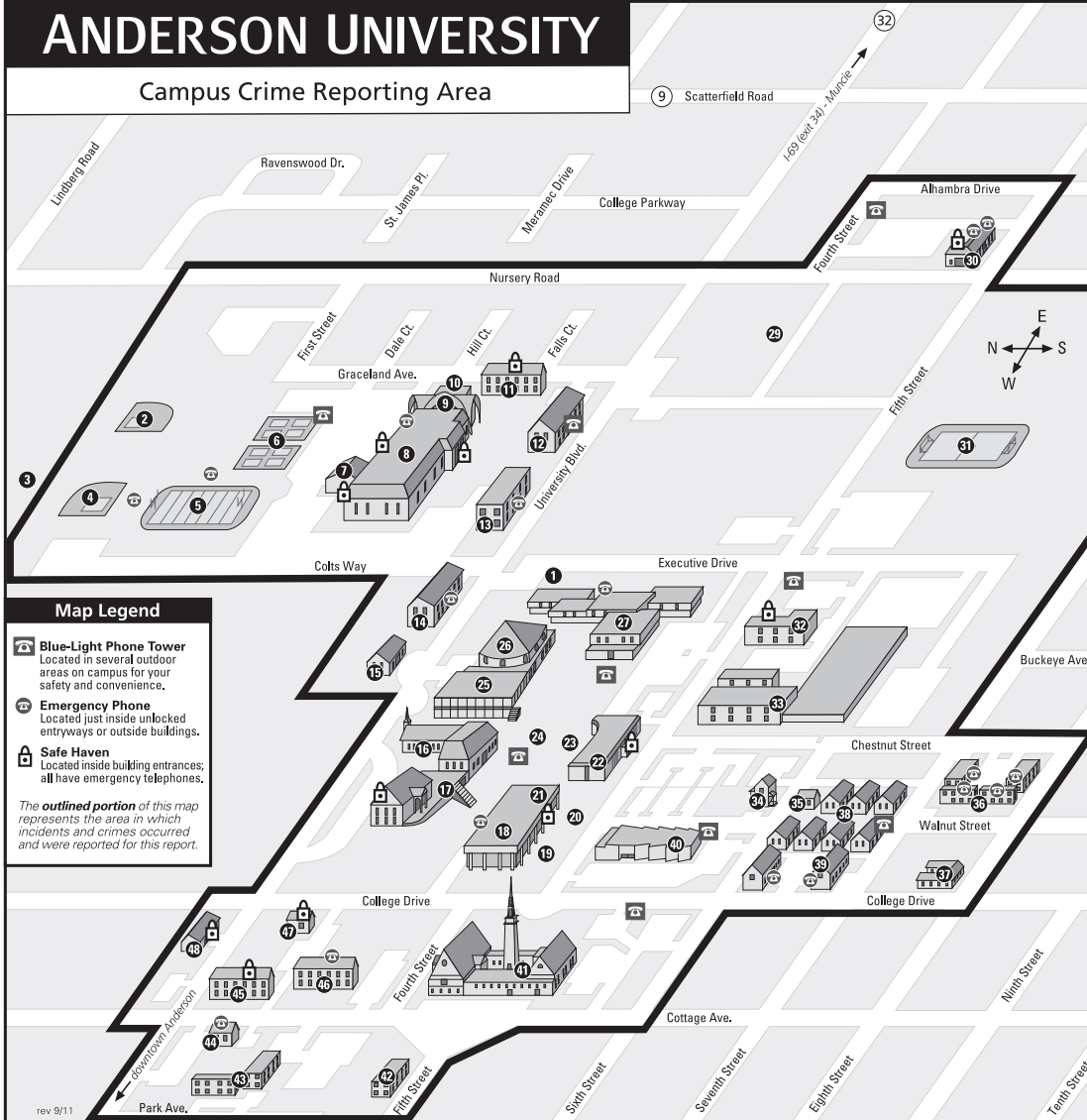

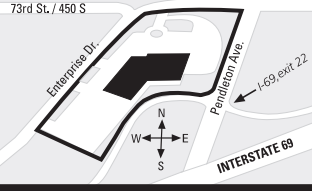
