

Eligibility Criteria

To be eligible for participation, a student must:

- Be an Indiana resident
- Be enrolled as a full-time student at an eligible Indiana institution
- Be offered a state financial aid award during the academic year in which the student plans to work (If the student plans to work during the summer, be offered an award during the previous academic year)
- Not have obtained a bachelor's degree prior to the term the student plans to work.

EARN Indiana, launching in Summer 2013, revamps the existing state work-study program. Students with financial need will have access to resume-building, experiential, paid internships, while employers receive state matching funds in exchange for hiring these students. EARN Indiana will partner with Indiana InternNet to better match students and employers to maximize each student's academic success and career achievement and to assist employers in finding the perfect fit for their team.

EARN Indiana positions give students professional experience and networking opportunities, readying them for a career after graduation.

Internship Value
